Junior and Teen Leader Policy

Jr. Leadership is for youth in grades 6-8, or if home schooled, youth must be at least 11 years and no more than 13 years as of January 1st of the program year.

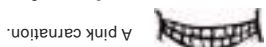
Teen Leadership is for youth in grades 9-12; or if home schooled, youth must be at least 14 years old as of January 1st of the program year.

Are there differences between the Jr. & Teen Leader other than grade in school? Teen Leaders can assume more challenging leadership roles than Jr. Leaders. However, tasks have not been designated for Jr. & Teen Leaders since there are different opinions about which tasks are appropriate for them. Thus the grade in school is used to determine who are Jr. Leaders and who are Teen Leaders.

As a Jr. or Teen Leader you are never permitted to work with a project group without an adult project leader present. Teen Leaders are not covered by UC liability when driving during, to, or from any 4-H event or activity. There is no longer liability coverage for anyone under the age of 18. The University of California extends liability coverage to volunteers and the 4-H program defines volunteers as those being adults 18 years of age or older.

As a Jr. or Teen Leader you need to plan ahead and write those plans down. Be sure to obtain a copy of the Leadership Plan and Report from your Community Club Leader. Review the form carefully with your project leader, discuss your role and make plans together. A detailed plan of your proposed work must be submitted to and signed by your project leader before you start your project. Good luck to all of you!

Project Meeting Policy

Remember, to qualify as a 4-H project, project groups are to have a **minimum** of five (5) separate project meetings with at **least** ten (10) hours of instruction.

Working With Youth

Adults who are responsible, and who demonstrate respect and confidence in youth, make effective leaders. The role of 4-H volunteers includes teaching and mentoring youth and coordinating activities.

A 4-H leader should provide:

- An outline of goals, requirements, and costs of participation.
- A learn-by-doing experience.
- Well-planned meetings in a safe environment, conducive to learning, with materials available and skills to learn.
- Encouragement to participate in other 4-H activities.

Project Leaders should make sure that the project group is a manageable size. If there are too many members, or if there is too much variation in the levels of age and experience, the group needs to be divided.
